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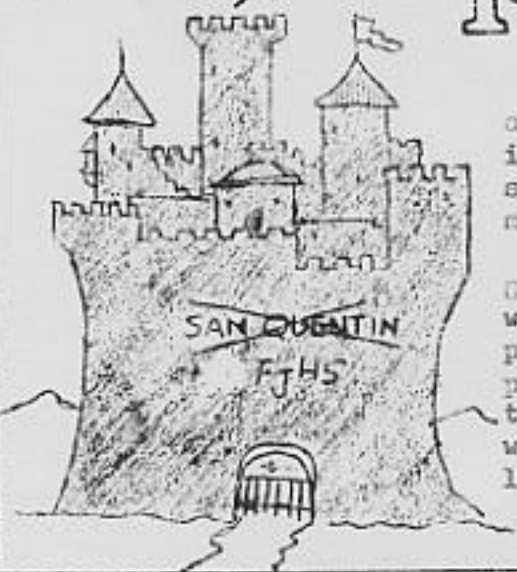

Have you ever had that feeling of "just wanting to get away from it all"? If you have, one good way is on a tour to South Africa, for a warm, sunny vacation.

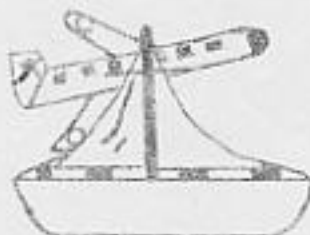

In 1848, 'Frankfurt am Main' became the hope of Germany for democracy, as representatives from all over Germany used Frankfurt as the first

meeting place of the first German National assembly.

To most people, Frankfurt has become the unofficial, second capital of West Germany as shown by her political, economical, and transportation importance.


